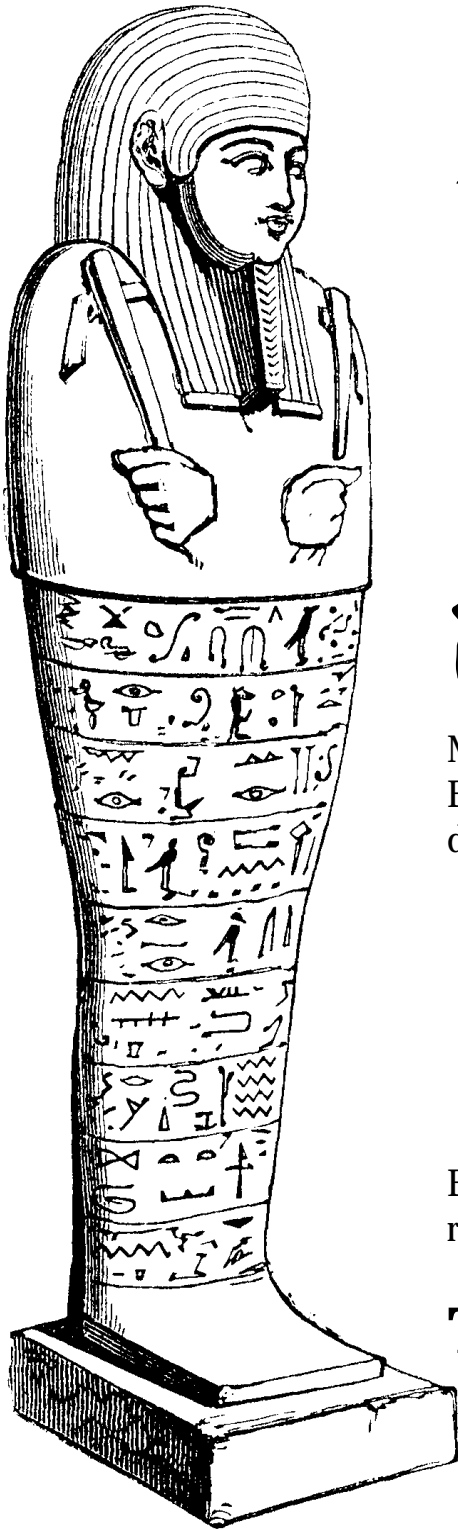

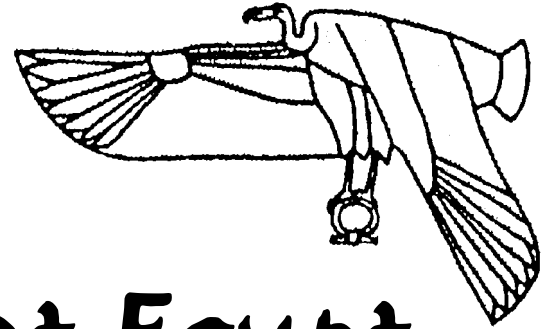

Mummies and tombs are among the most famous aspects of ancient Egyptian culture. This lecture will explore the practical aspects of death. Questions that will be explored include:
